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Show and Tell: (8 presenters)

Larry Pfost



Larry finally had time to finish up his kitchen cupboards after repairing storm damage to his shop. A tree fell on his shop. He brought in one of the cupboard doors he completed and as you can see the cupboards are made using knotty pine. He used shellac as the finish as it is an excellent choice for sealing knotty pine. He

used several coats, sanding between each coat. He noted that his first attempt at finishing did not produce the desired color match. The primary reason is that the shellac he initially used was well beyond its shelf life. New shellac, problem solved.

Jim Terrill



Jim brought in his latest turnings. The bowl on the left has some inlayed brass (key filings) used to repair defects in the wood and provide interesting accents. The wood looks like walnut but did not exhibit the characteristic walnut odor when turned. After asking members what they thought it could be there was no consensus as to what it could be. The lidded vase on the left once again showed Jim has not lost his touch creating the "snug fit" with a pop. The pen shown is cocobolo with a CA finish.

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Tim Bynon



Tim brought in his solution to furniture disassembly. He showed 2 clamps, a Jensin clamp and a Quick clamp both modified to operate in reverse. This allows the clamps to be used to pry furniture components apart. He removed the retaining rivets on the clamp bars and turned the clamps around. Notice the socket wrench on the Jensin clamp. Like a number of us Tim is starting to have some annoying arthritis in his hands making it more difficult to tighten those clamps and vices. He found a way to resolve that issue by using a socket hammered onto the clamp handle. Now he can tighten the clamps without hurting his fingers.

Dave Boutcher



Good thing Dave explained what this item was. We would never have guessed it. Not unless you are into biking and have a very expensive bike. This is a bike stand. The item in the stand is a crank arm and pedal. He left the rest of the bike home... The stand is tailor made for his wife's bike making it easier for her to store here bike upright.

I guess a need a mug shot of Dave.

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
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Gene Wagg

Ron showed a number of pictures of the horse/pony cart he made a number of years back. The cart was his design. He bought the wheels, shafts, circle bar and leaf springs from the Pennsylvania Amish, and the foot box and dash were made from Hickory. He fabricated and welded the steel himself and finished all the wood parts with several coats of Spar Varnish. It cost about \$2000 and took 6 months to make. His wife used the cart for dressage and cross-country Marathons as well as for picnic drives. Some of the competition events his wife drove in were in Oakdale. He said that their pony really looked forward to pulling the cart.

The inspiration for this turning tool storage rack came from a turning class Steve took some time ago. Wish mine were that organized.

Paul Velk



The project shop organizer project challenge gave Paul the chance to finish a project he started some time ago. The drawers he had made and were hanging around the shop. For the cabinet he used some of his store of scrap wood.

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Mark Butzler



Mark made this tool storage chest of drawers using mostly scrap material. The knobs where left over from practice turnings on his antique lathe. He did have to purchase some ½" mdf for the drawer separators.

Bruce Hall



Bruce has a lot of cordless tools and needed a place to conveniently store/organize them. He came up with a unique way to mount them on his battery charging cabinet. He cut the top/mounting end off old batteries and screwed them down to the cabinet top. To store a tool now, all he has to do is set it on the old battery mount. The battery part he recycles so all is well.

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Homer Rail



Homer showed off this organizer tray. The separators are Maple. He was able to get the separator material this thin using a planer, which is NOT easy to do. Thin pieces have a tendency to chatter and blow apart in the planer. He said some did.

Harvey Myers



Harvey showed us this cordless tool charging station. Not only can he have all his chargers in a single location but he can have his cordless tools in one place as well. Note the drill storage depicted in the inset picture.

A charging station? That's what Jim said it was. It has lots of cubby holes and a large drawer for storing/organizing "stuff". Is this really a shop organizer? Look like a really fine piece of furniture.

OK, when Ron creates a project you can count on it being a unique piece. His sand paper organizer cabinet project is no exception. You can see from the inset that he incorporated a chamber door which is a favorite fabrication challenge of Ron's. He used repurposed White Oak table leafs and some Hickory for construction. The wood is over 100 years old. The stain he used is chestnut. It's hard to believe that this is a shop organizer piece. His wife has her eye on cabinet so he better keep it in a safe place

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Jerry Preston



There are a number of things you need when you have a lathe. They include a solid stand and lots of storage. Jerry obtained these attributes when he built this solid latch cabinet. The weight provided by the cabinet and ALL the lathe tools and accessories really helps keep the lathe solid when turning.


