### Cabinet presentation by Melody and Tim Bynon



This month GCW member
Tim Bynon and his wife
Melody gave a presentation
that chronicled their life and
times in the custom cabinet
business. During the slide
show presentation they
alternated in describing their
progression from how they got
started in making audio
products in the early days to
their cabinet production
business plus many examples

of their custom cabinetry. There was an emphasis on how they adapted to new fabrication techniques and how cabinetry styles have changed over the years.

How did this all get started? Well Tim was always interested in creating through woodworking. His first commercial efforts occurred in the 70s in Santa Rosa when he was making custom speaker cabinets. During this period he met Melody and together they created a business making audio related cabinetry. They also had a line of products that were geared toward maintaining LPs. They called their company Audio Works. From the audio cabinetry they naturally progressed to larger cabinet projects.

They became specialized in designing and fabricating custom cabinetry that included entertainment centers, kitchens, office furnishings, formal display centers, and many other special applications. There specialty was in the European Style cabinets that generally do not require a face-frame. Their many customers included homeowners and businesses alike.

It is obvious that their business was a team effort as both Tim and Melody had design and fabrication responsibilities. During the presentation it showed that Melody was quite at home in the shop and in the picture above, Melody is seen describing one of the projects that she designed.

While describing production methods Tim explained that over the years there were many instances where he had to improvise to create or modify tools to aid them in their production efforts. A couple of examples include the dovetail jig (see show and tell section) and the 54" horizontal belt sander (shown during the May shop tours). In addition to the many woodworking skills they had to develop to produce their products, Tim found the need to acquire skills in metal working. These skills he continues to use in his hobby building steam powered locomotives.

- b. **Helpful Tip:** Ron Sexton passed along a helpful tip to our members regarding the use of measuring devices in your shop. He recently was working on a project and like most of us we have "numerous" tape measures located strategically throughout the shop. As luck would have it, the project pieces did not fit together well. After some research he determined that the problem was due to the differences in the various tape measures he used. The capture tab on each had slightly different slide distances. This could be due to wear and tear or just manufacture variances. Moral to the story is, when critical measurements are required be sure to use the same measuring device for all critical project components.
- c. **Artists Studio Tour event:** Jim Terrill passed along that there is a free Artist Studio Tour event sponsored by the Placerville Arts Association scheduled for Sept. 23-24 and Sept. 30 and Oct. 1. ### Tim and Melody Bynon



Before Tim and Melody gave their presentation on their journey in the cabinet business they showed the dovetail jig they used in their cabinet business. It is an old Sears unit that Tim modified for better clamping capability and to make it more suitable for a production environment. Melody was the primary user of this unit and made more than just a few drawers. It is set up to do ½ blind dovetail joints as pictured in the photo above. Tim described the clamping modifications while Melody explained how she used it in her production role. It is obvious that melody is very proud of her abilities in the woodworking shop environment.



#### Larry Gross

Larry brought in this very unique table. He designed and fabricated it about 1 ½ years ago and used repurposed oak wine barrel staves. This project required the use of 2 barrels and took almost 2 months to make. He volunteers at Hollys Hill vineyard in El Dorado County for club events and to help do the bottling. Most of his 8-10 year old wine barrels are recycled red barrels. After their careers end he gives them another chance and has made a number of items using them.

In this case he had to do some very creative re-dimensioning of the staves in order to make them usable in this project. He used sanding and grinding to remove the curved surfaces so he could lap and glue the staves for the

top. He used marine 2 part glue and many clamps to construct the top (see additional pictures below). He flattened the top using sanders. The legs are doweled and the finish used was Danish Oil.

### Raffle Results:


We use the "raffle per item" method for distributing raffle prizes. Members put raffle stubs in a receptacle associated with a specific prize they are interested in.
