Show and Tell: (7 presenters)

Bill Meronek



Bill brought in this branding iron his wife had custom made for him. Here he used it to custom sign a cutting board. I suspect he uses a propane torch to heat it up. Now he can put his initials on all the fine projects he builds.

Mark Butzler (project 1)



Mark brought in 2 projects this meeting. The first one on the left is his shop made Longworth chuck. This type of chuck is useful when finishing off the bottoms of turnings. The chuck mounts on his vintage lathe he recently acquired using a faceplate. He found the plans for it on the net at http://ravenview.com/blog/2010/10/17/how-to-make-a-longworth-chuck/

The construction involves making a pair of disks with routed arcs that rotate against each. By rotating the disks the eight rubber plugs mounted with wingnuts and screws are drawn in or out on the opposing arcs depending on the direction of rotation. After adjusting the rubber jaws to the turning project inner or outer rim the wing-nuts are tightened causing compression and retention. The silicone rubber plugs were found locally at The CHI Company, 6070

Mark Butzler (project 2)



Another project shown by Mark was this jig/tool he made to simplify the setting of the knives on his joiner. It uses a Micrometer Dial Gage mounted in a block containing magnets. He locates the jig on the out-feed table near the knives. After calibrating the gage to the out-feed table he sets the gage at each knife blade and adjusts the blade to the same height as the out-feed table. I need to make one of these...

John Cassidy



Johns brought in this candle stick. He used a piece of red oak turned round on a lathe, then used a Craftsman router crafter to create the barley twist. The base is turned from red oak also. To finish he used an early American stain and 3 coats polyurethane. Candle cup was found at Michaels. As a note, the Craftsman Router Crafter is becoming a rare item. He found his on Ebay. You won't find it in the Craftsman catalog!

Bob brought in this fine heart shaped keepsake box. He used a number of wood species to give this piece some eye catching contrasts. It is a bandsaw box and the primary wood is birdseye maple with and is accented using zebra wood. The leaves really define this project.

Ron showed this TV stand he made for the bedroom. He used white and black oak in the construction. It features 48 mortise and tenons, and space for DVR. For the finish he used a chestnut stain, and lacquer. For the top he chose to rubbed-out fine finish. This required 8 coats of lacquer and a number of rubout steps. As finishing is always a popular topic, members had numerous questions on the process of creating a "fine" finish.

Harvey brought in his latest wood sculpture. He created this one from an old somewhat rotten oak log. It is mounted to a rock base using steel rod. He used linseed as the finish. AS usual there was a discussion on what to call his latest piece. The usual conclusion fits best, "It's ART!" Could be a squirrel slide? He also brought in some carved spoons (see inset). These he carved from sassafras. Sassafras wood/tree is a new one on me.

We use the "raffle per item" method for distributing raffle prizes. Members put raffle stubs in a receptacle associated with a specific prize they are interested in.


