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Portable Saw Mill presentation by Steve Cabrol



This month we had a very special presentation by Steve Cabrol and his partner Rich Reep. They brought their portable saw mill to the church parking lot to show and demonstrate. During the demonstration an approximately 16" by 15' pine log was milled into usable planks. We don't have many presentations where our members get to see and participate in generating sawdust, and there was lots of saw dust!

The demonstrated mill was a Norwood HD 36. The cut width is 28 inches, and it is capable of handing a 36 in diameter log, although that would be very difficult to handle without quite large equipment. There were three primary reasons why Steve and Rich chose this manufacturer. First, they can add features at any time they wish, where other manufacturers need additional features to be part of the final configuration. Second, the saw head is supported on both sides where others are cantilevered and seem to bounce more, and lastly you assemble the mill from parts and therefore understand how everything works. In addition there are lots of additional features that can be added like milling heads for making profiled logs for cabin construction, attachments for making shingles and lap siding, plus many others.

As mentioned, Steve's mill partner is Rick Reep. Rich is Steve's daughter in-law's father. They purchased the mill together about a year ago to produce lumber for several projects using logs from properties owned by their families. He said that for timbers of significant size the investment is reasonably cost effective.

Steve said that they are still learning the details of the mill operation like how to simplify the log handling process and

how to maximize the yield of different size logs. Above all, they are enjoying the challenges that go along with learning any new activity.

As far as projects they have worked on so far, the largest is a structure they are working on. It is an octagonal pavilion roughly 30 feet in diameter. Other projects were a couple of trailer decks, a shooting platform and miscellaneous small projects. They have also demonstrated the mill for potential mill purchasers and both opportunities resulted in sales.

Steve and Rick enjoy owning the mill and producing usable material that would otherwise rot away in the forest. They especially enjoyed the opportunity to demonstrate for the club and would be happy to answer any questions members might have about the mill and its operation. - b. **Tool Problem:** John Roberts asked the members for suggestions for improving the height adjustment mechanism on his drill press. The current crank design is hard on those arthritic hands. One suggestion from the floor was to change out the crank for a wheel. No one knew of a product that could automate the job.
- c. **Helpful Tip:** Max Lee passed along a helpful tip to our members on how to add to their screws, bolts and nut inventory cheaply. Many times hardware store employees are given the task of collecting hardware items customers place in incorrect bins. The collected items are set aside with the intention of resorting them when time allows. In most cases this task never is completed. Max suggested members ask at the hardware store to see if they can obtain some of the assorted hardware as he did. In many cases they will just give it away free or for a small cost just to make it go away. He was able to acquire a large jar of assorted items FREE.

Roy Carter



He sanded it to 400 then applied water based pre-stain to even things out. The finish used was is a water based varathane. Can't help but notice that this cat can look over his shoulder quite well.

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Tim Bynon



Tim found himself with a challenge some of us have also faced. He needed to make some new cabinet doors for a customer where frame profile had to match some existing doors. The cost of a new shaper cutter could not be justified for just 3 doors. During his show and tell Tim explained how he was able to use cutters he had on hand to duplicate the style and rail pattern required. The diagram on the right shows how each of the 3 cutters (picture above) were used. The results, he said, were very near a perfect match. *Note, don't miss Tim and his wife Melody's presentation at the August GCW meeting on Cabinetry and Dovetailing.*

Tony needed to make 3 duplicate turned lids for this project. He said it was quite a challenge to get them even close. The primary wood used was Orange wood. They look more than close to me.

Robert, our youngest member, won a mahogany turning block at the June meeting. Well we couldn't resist the urge to challenge him to bring in a turned bowl at the next meeting. Well he answered the challenge! He

spent some time at the shop of a family friend, Mr. Mark Stanley. He gave Robert some direction on the lathe and tools. The outcome is the bowl shown above. Note, this his first attempt at woodturning. I'd say he did a great job don't you? It is obvious he has a great future in woodworking. The finish he used is walnut oil.

Ron continues to explore new craft opportunities. This time he created 2 stone pennants. The stone is Serpentine Stone that he found on one of his daily walks near his place. He used a Dremel tool and diamond bits to shape the stone and 2000 paper to polish it up. Then he added a coat of wax. He cautioned that the dust should be vented to the outside especially in this case becase Serpentine contains high levels of asbestos.

Like a lot of us John has lots of items that require charging. To knock down the clutter he decided to create a charging station. The design used Baltic birch covered by a walnut veneer. With the number of projects he has brought in that follow the "let's get organized theme", he has to be one of the best organized members of our club. Right John?

Gail Cone



This turned vase by Gail incorporated a number of wood species and took some time to create. The wood species, in order, starting at the bottom are Liquid Amber, Almond, Blood Wood, Maple Burl, Blood Wood, Almond, and Cocobolo Wood. The finial has Cocobolo, Almond, Cocobolo and Almond sections. The Finial is actually a stopper for the main vase. The bottom section of Almond is made up of 2 hollowed sections placed back to back and grain matched to produce the desired wave effect. Some may remember some pictures from the, Gail's, June CA presentation. The vase was part of the presentation showing how CA can be used to add aluminum powder to the burl voids. All wood layers of the project were assembled using medium thick CA glue. The finish is several layers of lacquer applied using an HVLP sprayer.
