### Presentation by Gene DePue:



Our night's feature presentation was given by Steve DePue a woodworking artist and professional woodturner from Greenwood, Ca. Steve came to our attention when he was featured in the Mountain Democrat April 8 2016. Steve gave a very informative and clear presentation of his woodturning art, creating beauty and function in walnut. His presentation included turning bowls, segmented turning, turning procedures and tips. The name of his company is Walnut Woodworks. Steve is a former

woodshop teacher and his early start in woodturning was just one of the many woodworking directions he pursued. His second passion is bike riding where he rides all over the US in organized events.

Most of his turning work is with English walnut and black walnut. He explained that you can identify English walnut by its long dark stripes. It grows fast and exhibits lots of sapwood. English walnut is typically grafted onto black walnut root stock because black walnut is disease resistant.

He obtains much of his wood from orchards in the valley where trees are being removed and for a nominal cost. He cuts his own turning blanks from the logs he acquires but before cutting he spends a good deal of time studying the log. He endeavors to work around the ever-present heart check.

Many of his finest pieces are turned from the graft area of the walnut tree which is his specialty. The graft area shows a definite contrast of the English and black walnut and results in a beautiful bowl as shown in the example below right.

Generally his bowls are green turned to a consistent thickness about ¾". He uses a faceplate with #10 or #12 screws to secure his turnings on his Nova lathe. After turning he dates and stores them until the rough turned bowls are ready to be turned to their final thickness. This takes up to 5 years in many cases. The picture below shows several rough turned bowls that have been drying for some time. Steve measured the diameters around some to show the amount of warping that has occurred since they were turned, over ¼" in many cases.

Also discussed was the drying process in some detail, mentioning issues with other varieties of wood. Examples were almond wood that is very difficult to dry and madrone that warps quite easily. When drying wood there are 2 moisture levels to consider, free water and cell water. It was pointed out that free water is that water that exists between wood fibers and takes much less time to leave the wood.

His segmented bowls are generally made using cutting board layouts. The cutting board layouts are made from several contrasting wood species laminated together. An example of one of his segmented bowls is shown in the example below left.

His finish of choice is Salad Bowl finish by General Finishes. This is a polyurethane finish and is food safe. He generally applies 3 coats.

#### Paul Velk


