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### **Presentation Cabinet Construction:**



Dale gave a great presentation covering many aspects of cabinet making and installation. First off he gave a summary of his experience in the cabinet related industries. His career began when he became an apprentice in a cabinet shop in 1972 and studied industrial arts for 2 years. He moved to Sacramento in 1976 and worked for Norcal Millwork making heavy beams and wide crown molding. He worked for Continental Store Fixtures for 11 years installing cabinet fixtures in stores such as Macys and Nordstrom. One project he is most proud of is the

refurbishing of the large double doors on the Cal. State Senate Building (picture below). He was also a principal in a cabinet shop responsible for sales and installation for a few years. In addition to his many years in the cabinet related field he spent a number of years in the carpentry trades, building homes. He says his favorite projects were and still are making kitchen cabinets. He went over some history on how

materials and cabinet fabrication methods have changed over the years.

During the presentation Dale showed some pictures depicting the various aspects of fabricating cabinets.

One slide showed the many joinery methods that can be used in cabinet making (picture on left). He said that dowel and biscuit joinery is his favorite for constructing face frames. He noted that pocket

joinery is heavily used in today's cabinet industry.

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
and rails much easier and more consistent.

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#### GCW Member Focus: Mark Butzler



As far back as he can remember Mark has always been interested in making things out of wood. He says that most of what he made in the past, by today's standard, was not very good. Of course, his mother told him they were wonderful. After that he was not afraid to attempt building anything.

As a young man he remembers making book shelves and headboards for his bed while living in a 2 bedroom apartment in the Bay Area. It's a wonder he never got kicked out because of all the noise.

In 1978 he moved from the Bay Area to Colfax, CA where he built a small 2 bedroom house. He said that he had no idea of

what he was doing but did read lots of books and the house came out pretty good. Back then it cost \$15000 to build, not counting the cost of the land.

Mark has always been employed by companies to fix and build their machinery. At times, he couldn't believe that they would pay him to make and fix things because he enjoyed it so much.

His goal for retirement was to build model airplanes and join a woodworking club. Through his wife he met Bill Meronek and Bill invited Mark to come to one of the club meetings to check it out. He was hooked after the first meeting, Nov. 2015, and has enjoyed himself ever since. He says there is a wealth of information at each meeting and that he has learned so much from the club members. He met Tim Bynon, also a club member and an avid model airplane builder and flyer, so he is now learning how to fly model airplanes.

Mark now has a small wood shop in his half of the garage. Quoting Mark, "sometimes my poor wife feels like a single woman because of all the time I spend in the wood shop".

Mark is not afraid of taking on challenging projects and is really stepping up his woodworking abilities. Using the vintage lathe he refurbished, some of his first turnings include tapered chair legs, a bowl and a unique rolling pin. The resulting quality shows he has a real knack for wood turning. He also has shown, at our show and tells, a number of jigs he fabricated including a longworth chuck and tenoning jig. These along with the spinner's chair he recently made, demonstrate his expanding abilities in woodworking. He is currently researching a project to build a "drum thickness sander". Ron Sexton recently commented that Mark's finishing techniques have really improved, noting that "the quality of a finish is the first thing he looks at". We know we will continue to see great things from Mark as time goes on.

- 4. **Wax discussion:** There was a discussion at the May meeting on the right type of wax to use for protecting a finish. Ron Sexton in response to a number of questions and members input provided recommendations on what and what not to use. The recommended wax is a good quality carnauba paste wax. It is recommended not to use car wax, or spray waxes as their formulas can actually damage or cause the finish to acquire a haze. Tip: If your paste wax looks dry and cracked, to renew it, just heat it until liquid and allow it to cool.
- 5. **Brewery tap handle project:** At the May meeting Ken Welsh asked the members to make some Brewers Tap Handles. He needs 24 in total. The handles are for a friend of his that owns a brewery. The Handles would measure approx. 11"x2 1/4". They can be round, square, a unique shape, any wood species, decorated or not. The mounting end needs to be at least 1" facilitate mounting to the beer dispenser. Members can make any number they wish. ## **Show and Tell: (11 presenters)**

#### Dave Boutcher



Dave created this ottoman to match his TV stand. He used oak in the fabrication and stained it to match the color of the TV stand. He used lacquer as the finish.



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#### Mark Butzler





Mark brought in 2 items, a Spinner's chair and a Celtic rolling pin.

The spinner's chair he replicated from a chair his wife, Judy, barrowed while taking a class in wool spinning. He made patterns for the project while repairing the original, badly worn (run over) chair. It took some creative wood working to get it all back together properly. A cool feature of this chair is that the back is removable for storage and travel. The narrow back allows the spinner the freedom to draw back their arms while spinning. He used his vintage lathe to turn the tapered legs. Needles to say his wife loves the chair.

While making the Celtic Rolling pin Mark learned several lessons: the hardwood blank must be straight and square, the wood sandwich inserts must be flat and of uniform thickness, must add alignment marks, be watch full of slippage and add alignment marks before you do any cutting to help with the reassembly. For plans search the internet for "Celtic knot rolling pin". He used KOA (handles) and maple for the primary woods for this project.

#### Steve Paterson



Steve brought in 2 unique items to show our members, a fidget spinner and a relief of a favorite photo. The fidget finger spinner was shaped using his CNC machine. He used an old bearing pressed into the center to allow for the spin. He has idle fingers??

The relief was also created using Steve's CNC unit. He scanned a photo and downloaded it to his CNC to create the relief. The relief background was machined down to .05" and allows light to pass through highlighting the pictures features. The material is corian and it machines quite well.

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#### Max Lee



Max created a safe using an old postbox door he acquired at one of our clubs raffles. The safe is for his grandson so he can hide away some of his toys. Do the parents know the combination???

#### John Brideson



John brought in 2 keepsake boxes to show. They both feature double dovetail joinery. The one on the left incorporates a magnetic latch that causes the lid to pop up when pressed. John used his Incra Jig to create the double dovetails. He noted that he can get the accuracy to 1/5000" using the Incra Jig. He has offered to give a demonstration on the usage of the Incra Jig at a future meeting. It is attentively scheduled for January 2018.

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#### Jerry Preston



Jerry brought in a picture showing his version of a Molesworth sideboard. He also brought in a drawer from the his sideboard. The project is based on plans from the New Yankee Workshop. Thomas J.

Molesworth was an early 20th century Western style furniture designer. Jerry's sideboard has many of the features found in the original designs: logs, leather, relief features, and animal horns. Jerry planed down logs from his forest for the legs, and used large and small routers to

remove the background from the relief features on the drawers and doors. He used a 1/8 inch router bit to cut a worm-like random pattern on the face and door frames. The original Molesworth has a red leather top. Jerry used leather ette with a toned-down color for their room.

Jerry's first attempt to make the sideboard failed. He used Meranti marine plywood from an aborted boat building project of his. Clamping was difficult with the sloped side cabinets, and the case was not square enough for the tight tolerance of the drawer/case interface. He later discovered that he could remove the rubber tip from the brad nailer and use brads in the corner below the shelves to hold the shelves in the dado during glue up. He did use the specified case materials for the final product, and is happy that the first attempt failed.

#### Paul Velk



Paul brought in one of the two shop roll arounds he built for his shop. It features 3 drawers, locking casters, adjustable height top, table leaf extensions, and unit levelers. He is able to use the role arounds at multiple stations due to it's wide range of adaptability.

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#### Jim Terrill



In this Red maple bowl Jim incorporated an inlayed band of powdered dyed howlite (a turquoise substitute). The band measures ¼" wide and up to ¼" deep. He stated that you can't really tell the difference between the howlite and the real thing. He used the Beall Buffing system to finish his bowl.

#### Mick Dupper



What do you make a heart pendent necklace with? Well of course you use purple heart! Mick used a band saw, scroll saw, and 1/8" round-over bit, carving tools, and to sanding to create the shape. He used Minwax Polycoat at the finish. His wife made the necklace cord.

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#### Bill Meronek



Bill has created yet another fine table using his favorite wood, cherry. The creation was patterned after a table he saw in San Francisco that had a hefty price tag. He used a Craftsman Router Crafter to get the correct tapper then completed the fabrication on his lathe. For the finish he started with tungoil then a wipe on poly. He added a good coat of carnauba wax for protection.

#### John Roberts





John loves to make toy machinery, can you tell? He says he makes them for his grandson, but we are beginning to suspect he likes to play with them as well. He described how he goes about creating the tread on the wheels. The wheels are actually 2 parts, one reversed from the other. Each wheel half is grooved on the table saw using a jig to hold it and to set the groove spacing. The toys in the above pictures are just a sample of what he brought in to show. This is not the first time he has brought in a collection of his latest toy vehicles.
