## Show and Tell:

#### Mick Dupper



Mick is one of our many members participating in making toys for the GCW Toys for Tots effort this year. Here he shows 2 items he has made for this effort. On the left is a "White Elephant Puzzle" and on the right is "The Chicken and Egg". Well in this case we know which cam first, well the chicken, of course. When the chicken is moved forwards or backwards the egg rocks around. Very clever Mick!

#### Jim Hunt



Jim showed off his latest "Wood Art". In this case it is a segmented turning using Ash and Walnut. He described the problems he encountered while turning this project. There were 2 primary challenges. The first was the density of the woods used differed significantly sanding tended to affect the uniformity of the surface. The second issue was excessive vibration while machining the upper portion of the vessel. In many cases you need to machine the lower segment rings before adding more rings. He asked for suggestions to help mitigate both issues. On the sanding, it was suggested to try very sharp scrapers including cabinet scrapers with a light touch and very light sanding with fine paper. For the vibration problem, it was suggested to use a damping device (these

are rollers mounted on an adjustable "Y" frame mounted on the lathe). Also, he could possibly use a progression of padded disks of expanding diameters held in place by the tail stock as he worked toward the top. To explain, in a segmented turning it is necessary to generally develop the inner and outer shape to enable the craftsman to align the next segment ring accurately. As a result the shape is defined from the bottom up rather than the top down in solid turnings.

#### Rob Larsen



Rob decided to take the plunge and dive into a cutting board project. Here he shows the cutting board he crafted plus a set of salt and pepper shakers. The shakers were turned from Mahogany and finished using a friction polish. Note, Rob and his wife just recently started turning and it looks like their work is "turning" out great. Sorry about that... The cutting board was crafted using Walnut and Maple. The pieces were aligned with end grain showing in this project. He finished this project using a "Salad Bowl" finish. He described the issue he had with the applied finish. The finish tended to darken the maple and thus reduce the contrast he was hoping for. He asked for suggestions on how this could be alleviated in future projects. Suggestions included, thinning the finish being used, and or sealing the wood with a cut (thinned) sealer before finishing. Sealers suggested included shellac lacquer.

## Sam Garcia (guest)



Sam is in the formative years of his woodworking efforts. He chose a project that sounds simple, but from having attempted to make a set of knife handles myself, it can be a real challenge. This, seemingly simple, project challenges a new woodworker to develop skills

in planning, layout, fabrication (cut out, shaping, sanding, drilling), assembly and finishing. Did I mention patience? This knife handle was made using Manzanita and finished using polyurethane. He said that he acquired the knife blade from Amazon and used a thickness sander plus lots and lots of hand sanding to complete this project. I'd say he did a real fine job. He should be proud of it. Sorry, didn't get a picture of Sam.

He found that alignment during the table saw cuts and subsequently assembly is of paramount importance. It takes a little trial and error to get it just right. His first attempt, he said, is a little off but you have to really look at it to see the error. He ended up using CA glue to reduce problems with slippage during assembly. 
