Plastics Presentation by Mr. Will Smith from All Plastic:



We had a very informative presentation by Mr. Will Smith from All Plastic in Rancho Cordova/Gold River. During his presentation Will described just some of the types of plastics that could be of help in our shops, their characteristics, plus fabrication techniques. Our members really found the information helpful as there are many cases where woodworking and the need for plastic fabrication come together. The following are just some of the

points Will covered in his presentation.

The plastics Will covered were acrylics, ABS, and polycarbonate with an emphasis on acrylics. He explained that acrylic sheets are manufactured in a cast or an extruded form. The cast has a higher cost and is not as available as extruded so, in many cases, it must be special ordered. Cast is harder and machines better than extruded using routers, drills, etc. However the extruded acrylic is more readily available, machines well, glues and cleans up well "it buffs up very nice". ABS plastic is not clear, generally is more difficult to cut because it tends to melt and clog when using routers, saws, etc. However, it is cheap, readily available and glues up well. The down side of polycarbonate is that it scratches very easy. Extruded acrylic plastic is the most popular product for home shop fabricating and is available in many forms (sheet, rod, cylinder, sphere, vase, etc) and is relatively inexpensive.

Will spent some time talking about fabricating with acrylic. This included how to cut, glue, route and form it. He demonstrated how to glue and thermal form some pieces. Some of the tools he suggested were drill bits with a steep rake, special carbide table-saw blades for plastic, heat-gun or plastrip heater, and a torch for edge polishing. He recommended that map gas be used for flame polishing edges instead of propane as propane tends to deposit soot in polished edges.

Acrylic glues, Will explained, are really solvents and come in high viscosity (watery) and gel forms. With liquid glue he suggested not filling the glue bottle more than half with solvent and maintaining a slight vacuum in the applicator bottle by squeezing some air out of the bottle before applying. The liquid glue distribution depends on capillary action. That is, it will flow along mating pieces when applied. For cleaner joints when gluing pieces together, say at 90 degrees; he suggests dimensioning parts so joints can be located slightly in from edges. Excess plastic can then be routed away leaving a

flush joint that will clean up easily. The gel glue is easier to control and apply, however the joints may not be as clean.

The All Plastic store is easily accessible to our members at 2271 Sunrise Blvd, Ranch Cordova/Gold River not far off of highway 50. All Plastic has many services and products available that may be of benefit to our GCW members. They carry a full spectrum of supplies related to plastics and plastic fabrication. In addition, they are ready to help with questions, with designs and or design ideas, plus they can fabricate custom designs on site in their "state of the art" shop. When visiting All Plastics be sure to mention you are a GCW member.

designing and fabricating breadboards at a future meeting. Ron Sexton has his number, so to speak.


